The Church Welcomes You

Diocese Celebrates Rite of Election and Call to Continuing Conversion

The Rite of Election and the Call to Continuing Conversion, the ritual at which 190 persons acknowledged their intention to receive the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist) at the coming Easter Vigil, was celebrated on Sunday, March 5, at the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton. Bishop Joseph C. Bambera presided.

The first part of the ceremony involved those who will be received into the Church through Baptism, known as catechumens, at the Easter Vigil. During the Rite of Election, the Church ratified the catechumens' readiness for the sacraments of initiation, and after inscribing their names in the Book of the Elect, the catechumens, now called "the elect," manifested their desire to receive these sacraments before the Bishop.

During the celebration of the Call to Continuing Conversion, which immediately followed the Rite of Election, those already baptized in the Christian faith in another denomination, and now seeking full communion with the Catholic Church, presented themselves to the Bishop, and, after having their readiness for the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist affirmed by their sponsors, were invited by the Bishop to join with the Church during Lent in a spirit of repentance and renewed fidelity to their baptismal covenant, so that they will be prepared for the joyous reception of the holy sacraments.

Those adults who were baptized Catholic but never confirmed, who have been preparing for the reception of the sacrament of confirmation at the Easter Vigil, were invited to participate in the ceremony by standing with the candidates for full communion.

During the Rite of Election and the Call to Continuing Conversion, Bishop Bambera asked those godparents and sponsors assembled to affirm that the catechumens and candidates have been faithful to prayer, study and living the tenets of the Catholic faith during the past year. The ceremony was witnessed by families, sponsors, pastors and parishioners who have been supporting the catechumens and candidates throughout their period of preparation.

Bishop Bambera told the assembly that God calls all of us – out of the ordinariness of our lives, as we are, to be his followers and what a wonderful blessing that is.

Addressing the participants in the ceremony, he said: "Your presence here today proclaims to all of us that you've heard that call and have chosen to respond. And today, my sisters and brothers, and especially you, our catechumens and candidates, know that God is speaking to you. He's calling your name today. He's saying that your life – with all of its struggles and joys, with all of its blessings and challenges – has a unique place and role to play within his plan.

"This day, as never before, hear the words of Jesus that come to us from Saint John's Gospel on the very night before he died, 'It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain.""

The scriptures, the Bishop noted, are filled with reminders of how God has worked in creation – always engaging his people in and through the events of their lives - never giving up on his creation – always faithful, ever present. Before the world began, the scriptures tell us, God chose a people to be his own – the people of Israel. And then, through his Son, Jesus, God chose all peoples to be loved, to be adopted daughters and sons, to be forgiven their sins and to inherit eternal life through Jesus' cross and resurrection.

"My friends, today, you are called by God. Your name will be spoken. Your name will be heard. And your name will be written in the Book of the Elect," he said. "My sisters and brothers – dear catechumens and candidates – as he has done since the beginning of creation, God places his hand on your shoulders today and chooses

you to participate in his Kingdom. Through the touch of your godparents and through the affirmation of the Church gathered around you in this sacred cathedral, God calls you forth to walk with him in faith. The initiative is God's. The necessary response is yours.

"You, in turn, do today what all who have pledged their lives to Christ have done through the ages. You begin a journey of faith. In response to God's call, you say yes to Christ. But in so doing, you not only affirm his presence in your life. You commit yourself to embrace his example of service and selfless love."

Bishop Bambera conceded that, as it was for Jesus, the journey that you begin today will likewise have its challenges. Yet, one thing is certain. Your election this day to become a part of the Church – to call yourself a Catholic Christian – does not merely result in membership in an association that seeks to promote a certain cause. To the contrary, it is a reason to celebrate. As Pope Francis has said so often, being a Christian leads to "joy ... the joy of faith, the joy of having encountered Jesus, the joy that only Jesus gives us, the joy that gives peace."

"May each of us, in whatever place along the journey of faith we find ourselves, give thanks to God this day for the gift of Jesus and his saving grace," Bishop Bambera said. "May you, our candidates for full communion in the Church, open your hearts to the Holy Spirit and to the power of Jesus

who will fill your life through the Eucharist. And may you, the Elect in our midst, boldly proclaim your faith in Jesus as you inscribe your names in the Book of the Elect and take your place with all of your sisters and brothers – young and old – rich and poor – saints and sinners, who have been called by God and chosen as his own this day."

This process will reach its culmination when catechumens and candidates receive the sacraments of initiation, but will continue, especially for the newly baptized, through a period during the Easter season called *Mystagogy* when the newly initiated share in theological reflection about the meaning of the mysteries celebrated at the Easter Vigil, and are warmly encouraged by members of the community to participate fully in the sacramental life of the Church.

All of the faithful of the Diocese are encouraged to pray for these catechumens and candidates as they enter into this period of spiritual preparation for the Sacraments of Initiation.

Progress Continues on New Church for St. Jude Parish

As one day unfolds into the next, parishioners and passersby can see more of the new church being built to serve St. Jude in Mountain Top. Bishop Joseph C. Bambera recently toured the site after celebrating Mass for the St. Jude Elementary School community.

According to St. Jude pastor Father Joseph Evanko, the current church building is 60 years old and in need of repairs and improvements. It seats approximately 550 people. The new building will seat 830 worshippers. When the new church is completed, the existing building will be razed and the space used for parking. The increased seating and parking are needed to accommodate the growth of the parish.






Catholic Men's Conference to Feature Spirituality, Dynamic Speakers

'God of the Gathering'

Lay Ministry Certificate Candidates Take Part in Annual Overnight Retreat

Twenty candidates in the *Diocesan Certificate in Lay Ministry* program took part in their annual Overnight Retreat experience, held this year March 3-4 at the Villa of Our Lady Retreat House in Mount Pocono. Coming together to begin the Lenten season in prayer as a community of leaders, the retreat participants who gathered represented 16 parishes from all four pastoral regions – across 8 of the Diocese's 11 counties.

The theme of this year's retreat, "God of the Gathering," focused on discernment – both in one's personal prayer life and in communal settings which call for attention to the movement of the Holy Spirit in planning on behalf of the parish. During the course of the weekend, members of the Office for Parish Life team led retreatants in prayer experiences, individually as well as in the larger group, and guided candidates in discussion and reflective activities.

Central to the retreat design was this Scriptural verse: "The Spirit is given to each of us for the good of all of us." (1 *Cor* 12:7) Participants renewed their understanding of the diversity of gifts bound together in the one Spirit. The group applied the philosophy of Sharing Wisdom, a consensus approach to group decision-making, to the real situations of their respective parishes and areas of ministry.

Some of the candidates expressed these reflections at the close of the retreat:

Kay Price, Queen of Apostles, Avoca: "This retreat was inspiring! People's professional skills were brought to light...food for thought for *all*. God in the Gathering!"



Judi Albury, Our Lady of Victory, Tannersville: "This retreat was a perfect way to start off my Lenten season. A moment to stop, reflect, and allow the Holy Spirit to re-light my 'pilot light.' We should do this more often!!!"

Elizabeth Potito, Most Holy Trinity: "I had a wonderful time at the retreat. The information on leadership techniques will be helpful, not just in parish life, but also in ministry, work and at home..... the talk on 'Praying in Color' adds such a great new technique to my prayer life."



Cathedral Announces Holy Week Services

The solemn observances of Holy Week, which recall the passion and death of Jesus Christ, begin on Palm Sunday, April 9. The Masses on Palm Sunday will include the blessing and distribution of palm branches, which play a symbolic role on this day since they were first used to commemorate the triumphant entry of Jesus Christ into the city of Jerusalem. The Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, D.D., J.C.L., Bishop of Scranton, will celebrate a Pontifical Liturgy at 12:15 p.m. at the Cathedral of Saint Peter, Scranton. Weather permitting, this Mass will begin in the Cathedral Prayer Garden with a blessing of palms and a Gospel reading, followed by a procession into the Cathedral.

Palm Sunday Masses at the Cathedral will also be celebrated at 4 p.m. on Saturday and 6:30 a.m., 10 a.m., and 5 p.m. on Sunday. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament begins at 6 p.m., followed by Evening Prayer and Benediction at 6:30 p.m.

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week, Masses at the Cathedral will be celebrated at 6:30 a.m., 8 a.m., and 12:10 p.m.

Confessions will be heard Monday, April 10, 7:30 to 7:50 a.m., and 5:30 to 7 p.m.; Tuesday, April 11, 7:30 to 7:50 a.m.; Wednesday, April 12, 7:30 to 7:50 a.m.; Good Friday, April 14, 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m., and Holy Saturday, April 15, 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Priests serving throughout the Diocese will gather at the Cathedral on Tuesday, April 11, at 4 p.m. for the Solemn Pontifical Chrism Mass, at which the Holy Oils used during the conferral of sacraments throughout the Church year will be blessed. Bishop Bambera will be the principal celebrant and homilist. Bishop Emeritus James C. Timlin and Auxiliary Bishop Emeritus John M. Dougherty will concelebrate the Mass along with all priests from the Diocese.

During this Mass, priests and deacons, along with lay representatives from diocesan parishes, acknowledge the Bishop's role as the unifying symbol for Church governance and pastoral guidance. Priests will renew their ordination promises. After Mass, they will receive the Sacred Chrism, Oil of the Sick, and the Oil of Catechumens, which are used in the celebration of Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders, the Anointing of the Sick, and the Rites of the Catechumenate. The deacons of the Diocese will assist in the blessing of the holy oils.

The three most sacred days of the Church's liturgical year, known as the Sacred Paschal Triduum, begin on Holy Thursday, April 13, with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper. During the Triduum (Latin for "three days"), the Church solemnly celebrates the greatest mysteries of our

SAINT PATRICK'S DAY DISPENSATION

During the penitential season of Lent, all Catholics are obliged to abstain from meat on Fridays. This ecclesiastical law helps us to commemorate as a community the Passion and Death of the Lord and to practice the self-restraint called for by this holy season.

Nevertheless, this remains an ecclesiastical law, and thus, the Bishop is able to dispense from this requirement for the spiritual good of the people entrusted to his care.

Saint Patrick's Day, March 17, 2017, occurs on a Friday in Lent, which is normally a day of abstinence for Catholics. Bishop Bambera acknowledges that celebrations honoring the Apostle of Ireland contribute to the spiritual good of the faithful in the Diocese of Scranton, and for this reason, he has dispensed all Catholics belonging to the Diocese of Scranton who partake in special celebrations in honor of Saint Patrick on March 17, 2017, from the required abstinence from meat in their celebratory meals. This applies to celebrations in parishes, fraternal organizations and families. This dispensation does not apply to other celebrations of Saint Patrick which take place on other Fridays in Lent. All the faithful who take advantage of this dispensation are encouraged to perform an act of service, prayer or sacrifice in keeping with the character of the Lenten season.

redemption, keeping by means of special celebrations the memorial of the Lord, crucified, buried and risen.

Holy Thursday marks the day on which Christ instituted the Holy Eucharist and the priestly Order and gave us the commandment concerning fraternal charity. At the Cathedral of Saint Peter, Morning Prayer will be at 8 a.m. The Pontifical Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper will begin at 5:30 p.m. Bishop Bambera will be the principal celebrant and homilist. During the Mass, there will be the rite of the Washing of Feet, which re-enacts Christ's washing of the feet of his apostles at the Last Supper. Following this Mass there will be the transfer of the Most Blessed Sacrament to the place of repose. Adoration will continue until 9 p.m., when Night Prayer will be celebrated.

On Good Friday, April 14, and the following day (up to the Easter Vigil Mass), by a most ancient tradition, the Church does not celebrate the sacraments at all, except for Penance and Anointing of the Sick. At the Cathedral, Morning Prayer for Good Friday will be at 8 a.m. The Commemoration of the Passion and Death of the Lord celebrated by Bishop Bambera will begin at 12:10 p.m. This solemn liturgy consists of three parts: the Liturgy of the Word, the Adoration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. In addition, the Stations of the Cross will be prayed at 5 p.m. Good Friday is a day of fast and abstinence.

Holy Saturday, April 15, is the day that the Church waits at the Lord's tomb in prayer, meditating on his passion and death and on his descent into hell, and awaiting his resurrection. Morning Prayer will be at 8 a.m. at the Cathedral, followed by a retreat for those preparing to be brought into full communion with the Catholic Church and to receive the Easter Sacraments. The blessing of Easter Baskets will take place at 1 p.m. in the Cathedral.

The Vigil in the Holy Night of Easter is the night of keeping vigil for the Lord (*Exodus* 12:42), in which following the Gospel admonition (*Luke* 12:35-37), the faithful, carrying lighted lamps in their hands, should be like those looking for the Lord when he returns, so that at his coming he may find them awake and have them at his table. This night's vigil is the greatest and most noble of all solemnities in the Church. Although celebrated entirely at night, this Mass of the Vigil is the first Mass of the Sunday of the Resurrection, and it is the center of the Sacred Paschal Triduum.

Bishop Bambera will be the principal celebrant and homilist of the Easter Vigil Mass at the Cathedral, beginning at 8 p.m. on Saturday, April 15. This liturgy is arranged in four parts: 1) the Lucernarium (a service of light) and Easter Proclamation; 2) the Liturgy of the Word, in which the Church meditates on the wonders God has done for his people from the beginning, trusting in his word and promise; 3) the Liturgy of Baptism and Confirmation in which new members of the Church are reborn; and 4) the Liturgy of the Eucharist, in which the Church is called to the table the Lord has prepared for his people, the memorial of his death and resurrection until he comes again.

On the Holy Night of Easter, 190 people who have participated in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) will become fully initiated Catholics by the celebration of their Baptism, Confirmation, and reception of the Eucharist for the first time. This will take place during Easter Vigil Masses celebrated in parishes throughout the Diocese. They join tens of thousands of other individuals throughout the world who will become members of the Church that night.

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord is the most joyous day in the Church year. This joy overflows into the 50 days of the Easter season, which concludes on Pentecost Sunday. On Easter Day, April 16, Bishop Bambera will celebrate a Pontifical Mass at 10 a.m. at the Cathedral. Additional Masses during the day will be at 6:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m.

Since Christ accomplished his work of human redemption and of the perfect glorification of God through his Paschal Mystery, in which by dying he has destroyed our death, and by rising restored our life, the Sacred Paschal Triduum shines forth as the high point of the entire liturgical year. Therefore the preeminence that Sunday has in the week, the Solemnity of Easter has in the entire year.



Cardinal Dolan urges passage of nationwide school choice bill

NEW YORK (CNS) – Cardinal Timothy M. Dolan of states "deserve the same opportunities." New York urged President Donald Trump to follow through on a recent call for legislation that funds school choice for disadvantaged youth nationwide.

Writing in a column for The Wall Street Journal March 9, Cardinal Dolan said he hoped that the president would "push Congress to make scholarship tax credits available to working-class families."

The cardinal called for rapid action in Congress so that families can benefit as soon as possible from having a choice on where to send their children to school.

Seventeen states already have scholarship tax credit programs and Cardinal Dolan said children in the remaining

under the program.

Under a nationwide tax credit program parents can opt to send their children to private schools, the cardinal wrote, noting that 97 percent of Catholic high school students in

the Archdiocese of New York graduate in four years and 95 percent attend college. The column cited the benefits of one such program, the Florida Tax Credit Scholarship program, for 300 students who attend St. Andrew Catholic School in Orlando, Florida, which Trump visited March 3 to announce his support for school choice. Statewide, nearly 98,000 children from

low-income families attend parochial or private schools

Cardinal Dolan wrote that scholarship tax credits "help advance educational and economic justice. They strengthen society by creating opportunity for those who might not otherwise have it."

He also cited a report in the Peabody Journal of Education in 2016, which reviewed 21 studies on the effect of school choice on test scores of students not participating in such a program. The authors found that in 20 of the studies, the competition from private schools led to improved test results for students in public schools.

The column concluded that taxpayers save money under school choice programs because school overcrowding and costs are reduced.

12 Rev. Joseph Allan Panuska, S.J., University of Scranton's 22nd President, Laid to Rest

The Rev. Joseph Allan Panuska, S.J., the longest-serving president in the history of The University of Scranton and the University's first President Emeritus, died on Feb. 28 in Philadelphia. He was 89.

Father Panuska became the University's 22nd president on July 1, 1982, succeeding the Rev. William J. Byron, S.J. He served as Scranton's president until July 1, 1998.

Affectionately known as "Papa Bear," Father Panuska's devotion to students was legendary as was the University's growth under his leadership. During his 16-year tenure as president, Father Panuska is credited not only with a construction boom that added 15 buildings to the campus, but with significantly increasing student applications and faculty head count.

Center for the Literary and Performing Arts, with its main theater modeled after Shakespeare's Globe Theater.

Father Panuska also became known for buying and renovating local churches. During Father Panuska's tenure, the University acquired three churches: the Episcopalian Assembly of God Church, which became Rock Hall and the home of Madonna della Strada Chapel in 1983; Immanuel Baptist Church, which became the

He displayed a strong commitment to local students, even as he expanded the University's reach and appeal to several states.

Francis and Elizabeth Redington Hall, the University's first suite-style residence, built in 1985, was Father Panuska's first major addition to campus. Redington Hall was followed quickly by the William J. Byron Recreation Complex in 1986, and Gavigan Hall, then a pioneering, residential-college concept, in 1989. The five-story, 70,000-square-foot Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Memorial Library followed in 1992. In 1993, the first students entered the McDade Houlihan-McLean Center for the Performing Arts in 1986; and the John Raymond Memorial Universalist Church, which was used for classes in fine arts and later housed Facilities Operations and became Smurfit Hall in 1987.

Campion Hall, the Jesuit residence, was finished in 1987 and paid for by the Jesuits. In addition to six new student residences, two classroom buildings, Kathryn and Bernard Hyland Hall, which opened in 1988, and McGurrin Hall, which opened in 1998 were added to campus.

In recognition of his service, the Board of Trust-

ees renamed one of the University's colleges in his honor — the J.A. Panuska, S.J., College of Professional Studies

Father Panuska's tenure was marked not only by buildings and symbols that remain to this day but academic improvements that paid off in the form of Fulbright Scholarships and other prestigious opportunities for students. Admissions applications continued to rise, as did average Scholastic Aptitude Test scores of incoming students, and U.S. News & World Report recognized the school among the nation's best universities. Many other accolades and rankings followed.

The University's endowment and annual giving also increased dramatically during Father Panuska's tenure. Father Panuska's presidency ended at the close of the 1997-98 academic year.

After Scranton, the seven-state Maryland Province of the Society of Jesus assigned him to become rector of its Jesuit Center, or mother house, in Wernersville. In 2004, Father Panuska returned to The University of Scranton's Campus Ministries Office, devoting particular attention to providing spiritual direction and programming for University staff.

Father Panuska taught biology at Georgetown University for 10 years and also served as rector of the Jesuit Community there. 

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

We were at mother's house all the time, and yet she would continue to call, asking why we didn't visit. It wasn't until mother went to live at St. Mary's Villa Assisted Living that I under stood.

We were with her often, but to my mother it was never a visit. We did her laundry, prepared her meals, managed her medications and planned doctors' appointments-but we never just visited. Now we can, and I haven't seen my mother as happy in a long time.

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This past Sunday, the second Sunday of Lent, we heard from the Book of Genesis this passage: "Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk and from your father's house to a land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you; I will make your name great, so that you will be a blessing."

It must have been extremely difficult for Abraham in his old age to pick up and leave his native land and his people to go to some unknown place. Abraham had to change his plans, let go of his fears, and completely trust in God.

Refugees around the world can easily identify with the sacrifice that Abraham made because they too have strong attachments to their homelands. Land keeps the members of an ethnic group together. Land is security; it is wealth; it is home.

Too often today good faithful people are challenged by poverty, hatred, violence, oppression, and



persecution and find themselves leaving the land they love. Although displaced and forced to flee from their home, they still have another "home" — the Church. People who are hungry or who have no place to lay their head find comfort in the Church.

Missionaries supported by the Pontifical Mission Societies reach out to help feed them, to bring them basic health care, to provide temporary shelter; in short, to bring the love of Jesus to them, reminding them that they are not alone. While we assist them in their needs, they remind us that we are all members of God's family. The prayer we pray at every Mass — the "Our Father" — comes alive, and as we pray for them they pray for us. Pope Francis observes in Evangelii Gaudium:

"The great danger in today's world, pervaded as it is by consumerism, is the anguish born of a complacent yet covetous heart, the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures, and a blunted conscience. Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor.

God's voice is no longer heard, the quiet joy of his love is no longer felt, and the desire to do good fades."

The blessing embodied in the Abrahamic mission, is also our blessing. When we pay attention to the whole world, we come to see those who might otherwise be overlooked and we respond. Our eyes and our hands are opened. And our hearts are filled. We become a blessing and, in turn, are blessed.

That's mission! Mission teaches us things that we cannot learn at school. What the missionary St. Columban taught is true: "A life unlike your own can be your teacher."

As we move through the holy season of Lent, let us recall both how much we are blessed and how we bless others. If there is a failure to bless, Lent is the time to repent and promise to do better. God called Abraham to abandon the familiar for the unknown. Abraham had room for a new call, a new place, and a new relationship with God. God blessed him and he became a blessing.



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Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551) or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Muldowney, V.G., at (570-207-2269).

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
