

Pope prays for dialogue, reconciliation in Jerusalem

VATICAN CITY (CNS) - Pope Francis called on Muslims and Jews in the Holy Land to "moderation and dialogue" as tensions continued around a key site in Jerusalem that is sacred to members of both faiths.

After reciting the Angelus July 23, the pope asked people gathered in St. Peter's Square for the midday prayer to join him in asking the Lord to inspire reconciliation and peace in the region.

Tensions in Jerusalem have been high since July 14 when three Israeli Arabs armed with knives and guns killed two Israeli police officers at an entrance to the site the Jews call Temple Mount and the Muslims call Haram al-Sharif. The site includes the Western Wall and Al Aqsa mosque.

In his main Angelus talk,

Pope Francis spoke about the parable of the weeds among the wheat from the Sunday Gospel reading.

The farmer in the parable from the Gospel of Matthew tells his workers not to pull up all the weeds because they might uproot the wheat, but to wait until the harvest when the wheat and weeds can be separated.

"With this image, Jesus tells us that in this world good and evil are so intertwined that it is impossible to separate them and eradicate all the evil – only God can do that," the pope said.

Human beings are called to the "difficult exercise of discernment" in choosing between good and what is evil, he said, and when they fail - which all people do sometimes – the church stands ready to help with the grace of baptism and of confession.

Like the farmer in the parable, the pope said, God calls Christians to be patient as they await the harvest.

"Patience means preferring a church that is leaven in the dough, that is not afraid of getting its hands dirty washing the clothes of its children, rather than being a church of the 'pure,' who insist on judging beforehand who is in the kingdom of God and who isn't."

U.S. bishop urges Senate to remedy health care after vote to proceed

WASHINGTON (CNS) – After the Senate voted July 25 to proceed with the health care debate, Bishop Frank J. Dewane of Venice, Florida, urged senators of both parties to "work together to advance changes that serve the common good."

The statement from Bishop Dewane, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development, said the health care reform proposals currently under consideration would "harm millions of struggling Americans by leaving too many at risk of losing adequate health coverage and continue to exclude too many people, including immigrants."

"We are grateful for the efforts to include protections for the unborn, however, any final bill must include full Hyde Amendment provisions and add much-needed conscience protections. The current proposals are simply unacceptable as written, and any attempts to repeal the ACA (Affordable Care Act) without a concurrent replacement is also unacceptable," he said in a July 25 statement.

Catholic convocation inspires leaders to set new course for church

ORLANDO, Fla. (CNS) - From July 1-4 the main floor of the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Orlando was transformed into a huge parish hall with places for worship, prayer and discussion during the "Convocation of Catholic Leaders: The Joy of the Gospel in America."

JULY 27, 2017 • THE CATHOLIC LIGHT N At the convocation, 3,500 church leaders - men and women religious, bishops and laypeople - gathered to set a new course for the U.S. Catholic Church.

> Following a retreat format, each day started and ended with group prayer. Mass was celebrated each day in the hotel ballroom, and there were plenty of scheduled times for the sacrament of reconciliation and private prayer in a large room turned into an adoration chapel.

> Many of the keynote sessions took the form of pep talks encouraging delegates to share their faith boldly with the world at large and within their own families and parishes. The numerous breakout sessions provided the working aspect of the gathering: closely examining what the church is doing and where it can do more.

> More than 155 bishops attended the gathering, sitting with their delegations for meals and breakout sessions. Cardinals and bishops who spoke at keynote sessions or in Mass homilies encouraged participants that this was their time, their moment, stressing the urgency to bring God's message of love to a divided world.

Throughout the convocation Pope Francis was pointed out as a model for modern Catholics to follow in inviting others, especially those on the peripheries, to Christ. Speakers also were quick to quote his 2013 apostolic exhortation, Evangelii Gaudium ("The Joy of the Gospel"), which lays out a vision of the church dedicated to evangelization - or missionary discipleship - in a positive way, with a focus on society's poorest and most vulnerable, including the aged, unborn and forgotten.

In his address, Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin of Newark

posed several questions:

As missionary disciples, we might ask ourselves, what do we see as we look around? How good is our peripheral vision? Where is God opening a door and beckoning us to enter? What pierces our hearts and leads us to weep?

In The Joy of the Gospel, according to Cardinal Tobin, Pope Francis insists the fundamental conversion needed today is a missionary conversion, a revaluation of everything about the Church and everything about us, the structures and activities, so that missionary outreach to people in the love of Jesus clearly is the first priority.

Tobin said. "The Gospel tells us constantly to run the risk of a face-to-face encounter with others."

True faith in the Son of God, the Cardinal said, "is inseparable from self-giving, from membership in the community, from service, from reconciliation with others. The Son of God become flesh summoned us to a revolution of tenderness. The Joy of the Gospel insists that our response of love to Jesus' love for us, and our willingness to share that love with others, is the most important reality of our lives.'

At the final Mass, described as a "Mass of Sending," Cardinal Daniel N. Di-Nardo of Galveston-Houston said the church is called to achieve great things in the

face of the impossible - to unite people together by going to the peripheries of society and sharing the good news of Jesus through action rooted in faith.

"Sisters and brothers, we are in a very, very significant time in our church in this country," said Cardinal DiNardo, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, and he urged the delegates to receive God's grace for the work ahead.

None of the homilists or keynote speakers sugarcoated the challenges for the modern church and more than once speakers pointed out that Catholics are leaving the church in greater numbers, particularly young adults, than those joining the church.

Delegates from Diocese Encouraged to Embrace Missionary Discipleship

The delegates from the Diocese of Scranton who participated in the recent Convocation of Catholic Leaders in Orlando were fortified in their commitment as missionary disciples and inspired to ignite a spirit of evangelization among all in our local church.

The Diocesan group, led by Bishop Bambera, was among the clergy and lay leaders from throughout the country who came together July 1-4 to assess the pastoral challenges and opportunities of our time, particularly in the context of the Church in the United States.

Convened by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), the convocation was focused on how best to respond to Pope Francis' 2013 apostolic exhortation, Evangelii Gaudium ("The Joy of the Gospel").

Our Diocesan delegation huddled on the final day to share their experiences and thoughts on how to fortify others in their baptismal call to missionary discipleship.

As a whole, our group was very grateful for the Bishop's invitation to participate in this unprecedented gathering of the U.S. Catholic Church, and felt affirmed both in their own particular area of ministry as well as the challenges and opportunities offered in the current reality of the Diocese of Scranton.

They were especially encouraged that the church is taking this kind of dialogue seriously, and is listening to a broad spectrum of voices - in particular from young people – as we discern together how we are being guided by the Holy Spirit.

The interaction fostered by the gathering gave participants the confidence that, in the midst of challenges, they were part of a supportive faith community that consisted of people of all ages and backgrounds.

Delegates described the experience as not just informational, but "formational," some saying it was an eye-opener about evangelization and "my" role in it and how "my" particular gifts were given for a purpose.

They expressed a renewed sense of hope that the Church is indeed moving forward, and we must be "radically welcoming" and actively invite those on the periphery, accompanying them on their journey to the Lord.

The convocation is a component of a multiyear process, and in the coming years the Diocese will begin to address how the insights gained will be applied to various areas of ministry.

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
Pope Francis' Prayer for Vocations

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Bishop Installs Parish Life Coordinators in Wilkes-Barre and Waymart

Bishop Bambera recently installed two new Parish Life Coordinators: Deacon William F. Behm for St. Andrew Parish in Wilkes-Barre and Deacon Edward T. Kelly for St. Mary Parish in Waymart.

When there exists an insufficient number of priests to serve every parish individually, Church law allows a Bishop to appoint a person other than a priest to provide the primary leadership in a parish and to attend to the pastoral care of the community, making daily decisions for the parish, and managing parish operations and finances. A deacon, vowed religious or lay person can be appointed as a Parish Life Coordinator, while a priest is also appointed to serve as the Sacramental Minister to celebrate Sunday

Masses, weddings, funerals and the sacraments, and to work collaboratively with the Parish Life Coordinator. In addition, a Priest Moderator is appointed to supervise the pastoral care and also serve as the Bishop's direct representative to the parish.

At St. Andrew Parish, Reverend Joseph A. Kearney serves as Sacramental Minister and Reverend John V. Polednak, V.E., Episcopal Regional Vicar for the Southern Pastoral Region, serves as Priest Moderator.

At St. Mary Parish, Reverend Joseph S. Sitko serves as Sacramental Minister and Reverend Richard E. Czachor, V.E., Episcopal Regional Vicar for the Eastern Pastoral Region, serves as Priest Moderator.





Bishops urge fair health care bill

The senators also could pass a measure that would repeal the current law without implementing a replacement.

In his July 25 statement, Bishop Dewane said, "There is much work to be done to remedy the ACA's shortcomings" and he called on the Senate to make the necessary changes.

He also stressed that "current and impending barriers to access and affordability under the ACA must be removed, particularly for those most in need. Such changes can be made with narrower reforms that do not jeopardize the access to health care that millions currently receive," he added.

In earlier statements, Bishop Dewane said U.S. senators must reject any bill that would replace the Affordable Care Act unless such a measure "protects poor and vulnerable people, including immigrants, safeguards the unborn and supports conscience rights."

The House passed its bill to repeal and replace the ACA health care law May 4 with a close vote of 217 to 213. The Senate's version collapsed July 17 after four Republican senators said they couldn't support it, leaving Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Kentucky, short of the 50 votes needed to bring the bill to the floor for a debate.

"In the face of difficulties passing these proposals, the appropriate response is not to create greater uncertainty, especially for those who can bear it least, by repealing the ACA without a replacement," Bishop Dewane said in a July 20 letter to U.S. senators.

He referred back to a Jan. 18 letter in which the U.S. bishops "encouraged Congress to work in a bipartisan fashion to protect vulnerable Americans and preserve important gains in health care coverage and access."

That letter reiterated principles he said the bishops laid out when the ACA was being debated in early 2010. "All people need and should have access to comprehensive, quality health care that they can afford, and it should not depend on their stage of life, where or whether they or their parents work, how much they earn, where they live, or where they were born," the bishops said at the time. "The bishops' conference believes health care should be truly universal and it should be genuinely affordable."

Catherine Butel Earns Doctor of Ministry Degree

Catherine Jantsch Butel, Diocesan Secretary for Parish Life for the past five years, has earned a Doctor of Ministry degree from the Graduate Theological Foundation.

She has been engaged in this course of study for two years, in an online learning format. The degree was conferred during the institution's Days of Convocation held in South Bend, Ind.

Catherine's studies concentrated on Pastoral Planning and Church Management, in order to bring additional resource to the needs of the Diocese. Her hope and intent is to continue collaborating with Diocesan and parish leaders to build on current initiatives with parishes in pastoral planning, bringing the plans to life, and assisting parishes currently in transition to various pastoral leadership team models.

The specific topics in the course of study included such things as: Fundamentals of Strategic Pastoral Planning; Pastoral Diagnostics – Understanding and Evaluating Pastoral Systems and Church Dynamics; Task, Role and Authority – The Building Blocks of Effective Church Governance and Planning; Pastoral Leadership and Pastoral Management; The Church Unconscious – The Hidden Motives and Expectations of Congregations; and Planning Implications for Multiple Parish Pastoring, Clustering and Reorganizing Churches.

A residential intensive institute on Transformational Leadership provided Catherine an opportunity for personal reflection and synthesis of the coursework, leading to her more formal thesis entitled: "The Loving Acceptance of Mystery and Its Unpredictable Disposal of Us – A Study of the Unfolding of Transformative Servant Leadership in the Church of Scranton."

Joining Catherine for the graduation celebration were her husband, Tony, who also serves in the Diocese of Scranton as Parish Life Coordinator in the parishes of St. Elizabeth in Bear Creek and St. Rita in Gouldsboro, and their daughters Angela and Teresa, both currently residing in Minnesota's Twin Cities.



State Budget Round Up for 2017-2018

Commonwealth's constitution requires governments to provide for the health, safety, and welfare of citizens

Governor Tom Wolf announced his decision to let the General Assembly's \$32 billion FY 2017-2018 spending plan become law without his signature, despite the legislature's unresolved negotiations for the revenue to back it up. The governor said he hopes that lawmakers "will come together to pass a responsible solution to balance our books."

The legislature is considering different revenue options including borrowing from other dedicated funds and expanding gambling, but holding the line on sales and personal income taxes. They must find a way to close the \$2.2 billion gap.

The Pennsylvania Catholic Conference (PCC) and the Pennsylvania Catholic Health Association (PCHA) tracks many elements of the budget debate, especially those line items that help families and assist the poor.

Education

Thanks to a strong expression of grassroots support, many more students could get scholarships to attend the school of their choice next year. The number of tax credits available for the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program in the spending plan will increase by \$20 million. The companion program, Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credits (OSTC), which gives the same kind of scholarships to students who live in underperforming school districts, remained the same with no cuts. When the legislature passes the school code bill, the increased tax credits will be authorized.

The tax credit scholarships have been an investment that has paid dividends for students seeking a Catholic or other private education in Pennsylvania. Every Catholic school in all corners of this great Commonwealth benefits from the EITC or OSTC programs.

Each year more than 40,000 families get a scholarship that permits the parents to send their children to a school that best meets their needs. It gives these families a true choice in the right educational path for their children

Social Concerns

The state constitution requires the state and local governments to provide for the health, safety, and welfare of citizens, especially the poor such as "mothers having dependent children and aged persons without adequate means of support." (PA Constitution, Article III, §29)


Funding for these human services was cut in some areas, but for the most part it was kept at the same level as last year. Catholic charities and social service agencies often partner with local governments to deliver these services to people in need. For example, local crisis pregnancy centers administer the state's alternative to abortion program that supports women through their pregnancy and up to the first year of their child's life. This state-funded program has helped thousands of mothers choose life for their babies.

Health Care

Line items that fund Pennsylvania's obstetrical/neonatal services, burn and trauma centers, and critical access hospitals remained the same; this is welcome news to PCHA and the Hospital & Health System Association of PA (HAP). The overall impact of the state budget on health care can be complicated. Questions about Medicaid and health care access for the poor remain unanswered as the debate in Washington, DC. continues.

The PCC and PCHA track and monitor many bills and proposed regulations in addition to the state budget. Stay up to date on all issues by visiting www.pacatholic.org, or lend your voice to the debate by sending a message through the Catholic Advocacy Network.



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



Ite missa est! This Latin

What is this "it"? Scholars and inquisitive minds have pondered



The "it" of the dismissal seems to indicate that the congregation is being sent, not sent home, but sent out into the world to bring the message of the Gospel to our homes, our workplaces, our schools, and our places of leisure.

Pope Benedict spoke about this notion in his Post-Synodal Apostolic Exhortation Sacramentum Caritatis. He reflected therein of the Eucharist as the source and summit of the Church's life and beautifully offers the following on the "ite missa est": "In antiquity, missa simply meant 'dismissal.' In Christian usage, however, it gradually took on a deeper meaning. The word 'dismissal' has come to imply a 'mission.' These few words succinctly express the missionary nature of the Church" (Sacramentum Caritatis, 51).

As I reflect on this new opportunity to serve the Church in the Mission Office, I hope each of us will reconsider the call we have received: The call we have received from Baptism and the call we receive when we receive the Eucharist and are sent forth

strengthened and nourished by Christ in the Blessed Sacrament and by the Scriptures; both given to us to ensure we have the means to preach the Gospel well and to serve the poor with love and devotion.

Ite missa est — go, it is sent. The Church is sent into the world. You are sent into the world. "As the Father has sent me, so I send you," Jesus charges the early apostles (John 20:21). Jesus charges you and me to the same call of being "apostolic" — of being sent forth into the world to be missionaries. We do not need to go far to take the message of the Gospel seriously; we need faithful, loving, and zealous missionaries here in the 11 counties of this Diocese we love and serve.

As we respond "thanks be to God" each time at Mass as we are "dismissed," may we pause in prayer and in faith to recommit ourselves to the missionary work of the Church and to proclaim the kingdom of God. Then, let us go forth.



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Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551) or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Muldowney, V.G., at (570-207-2269).






