First Communion and Confirmation

All parishes should consult the directives for celebrating First Communion and Confirmation found in the "Yellow Phase" Liturgical Guidelines. These may be celebrated in groups no greater than 25 when the county of the parish has moved into the Yellow Phase. Parishes may also choose to wait for a larger communal celebration when their county has moved into the "Green Phase." All of directives before, during, and after the public celebration of Mass must also be observed.

Mass in Time of Pandemic

Pope Francis approved the new Mass formulary, "In Time of Pandemic." The Mass texts and readings for this Mass are available in both English and Spanish and can be found on the diocesan website under Parish Life/Resources for a Time of Social Distancing.

Opportunities to continue to be servant leaders within our communities, to be the presence, the voice, and the heart of Jesus to one another:

Wedding Anniversary Mass/ Marriage Enrichment and Support

The Wedding Anniversary Mass will take place this year in a different format due to ongoing social distancing guidelines. The Mass will be celebrated by Bishop Bambera on Sunday June 14, at 2:30PM. The Mass will be livestreamed and anniversary couples will be invited to participate in the Mass from home, using the Wedding Anniversary Mass Program which they will have received in the mail. Anniversary Packets, with updated information for celebrating couples, have been mailed to all couples whose names were submitted by parish offices.

Because the Mass will be live-streamed, all married couples in the Diocese are invited to participate in the Mass from home as well. The Wedding Anniversary Mass Program will be made available on the Diocesan website, so that any married couple can follow along with the liturgy and speak the words of recommitment to one another when invited to do so. Particularly considering the stresses of the pandemic, this a valuable opportunity for all of us to pause and reflect upon the beauty of the vocation of marriage in our lives and in the life of our church. Guidelines will be sent to all parishes which will share ideas to help every community participate in this celebration of sacramental marriage.

Grief Support

We in the Diocese of Scranton, and all of us as brothers and sisters within God's creation, are suffering through a collective grief in this pandemic. Losses both minor and intensely tragic continue to accumulate, and many of the ways in which we normally cope with grief are inaccessible due to social distancing restrictions. Our bereavement ministries are needed now, more than ever. We can all continue to safely reach out to our communities through phone calls and letters. Also, at least one of our parish communities, St. Vincent de Paul Parish, has been continuing to gather their Bereavement Group virtually, using Zoom videoconferencing. Though face-toface interactions are the ideal, virtual gathering (Skype, FaceTime, Zoom, etc.) is another way we can continue to meet the grief and bereavement needs of our faithful during social distancing.

Another option you can extend to your community is a new resource offered through our Diocesan Office for Parish Life. It is a video streaming service provided through Paraclete Press. Through this subscription, any of our Diocesan faithful can access 40 different videos on topics such as grief and social issues (and faith formation for adults and children).

Safe Environment Tips for Conducting Remote Ministry Activities

Due to the recent and unexpected health crisis, our typical means of interacting with youth has been suspended. In order to maintain communication, the Diocese of Scranton lists the following directives on creating safe contacts with those under the age of 18.

- 1. Prior to initiating communication thru remote transmission, the parish representative must obtain approval from the Pastor, Parish Life Coordinator or their designate. The individuals must have appropriate background checks and training as per Safe Environment protocols. The mandates of the Code of Pastoral Conduct of the Diocese of Scranton should always be observed.
- 2. The Parent/Guardians of youth under age 18 should be made aware of and consent to virtual contact between the parish representatives and the youth. Any meeting times, dates and agendas should be shared with the responsible adult. The parent/guardian has the right to refuse participation.
- 3. Parents/Guardians will serve as the primary contact for the information needed to join the conference. Information should be sent thru the formal contact list and not via social media where those who are not invited are able to access. Meetings should not be conducted on a public platform. Parents are encouraged to attend.
- Do not make meetings or classrooms public. Use a meeting password or a "waiting room" feature to control the admission of guests.
- Do not share a link to a teleconference or classroom on an unrestricted publicly available social media post. Provide the link directly to specific people.
- 6. Manage screensharing options so that they are set to "Host Only".
- 7. Religious education activities target the age group 6 (first grade) and older. Youth ministry activities focus

- on young people ages 11 (middle school) and older.
- 8. Parent must be informed that the video portion of the broadcast is optional. They can choose to receive only audio transmission.
- 9. Video conferences should be recorded. If possible, two adults should conduct the meeting. If that is not feasible, recording is mandatory, and parents must be notified.
- 10. Contact with youth will occur only between the hours of 9 am and 9 pm. Direct, private contacts with youth are not allowed.
- 11. The individuals hosting the conference are reminded that this is a professional activity thus they are expected to dress appropriately. When possible, the setting of the meeting should be in an office or classroom. If that is not feasible, the physical location, including the background, should be void of any objects that the viewer might find objectionable or inappro-
- 12. In addition, before beginning the conference, youth should be advised of the rules for participation. Appropriate clothing, setting and language should be enforced. The device should be in a public area of the
- 13. Mandated reporting procedures apply. If the adult facilitator knows or suspects that a youth is being abused, they are required to report to ChildLine. The 24/7 number is 1-800-932-0313.
