

Dear Participants of the 4th Catholic Women's Conference of the Diocese of Scranton,

In his homily for this most recent Divine Mercy Sunday, Pope Francis spoke about the various resurrection appearances of Jesus to his disciples, suggesting that in order to bring peace to their hearts "Jesus raises them up with mercy. Having received that mercy, they become merciful in turn. It is hard to be merciful without the experience of having first received mercy."

By expressing this year's Conference theme as "With Merciful Love," the committee has invited speakers who will testify to the real mercy of God which they have experienced in their own lives, or which they have studied in the lives of well-known saints like St. Faustina Kowalska.

Each element of your day together will invite your own reflection on the taste and touch of God's merciful love in your own lives and the call to express that type of merciful love in all parts of the world entrusted to your care.

With Pope Francis, I echo the encouragement from that Divine Mercy Sunday homily: "Dear brothers and sisters, let us be renewed by the peace, forgiveness and wounds of the merciful Jesus. Only in this way will we proclaim the Gospel of God, which is the Gospel of mercy."



The ROSARY with Pope Saint John Paul II

Pope Saint John Paul II wrote a Letter on the Most Holy Rosary, *Rosarium Virginis Maria, (October 16, 2002).* The letter suggested to add to the traditional rosary some new mysteries. Suggested to be said on Thursday is the Mysteries of Mercy which we invite you to say today. Quoted from Pope Saint John Paul II.

"I look to all of you, brothers and sisters of every state of life, to you, Christian families, to you, the sick and elderly, and to you, young people: confidently take up the Rosary once again. Rediscover the Rosary in the light of Scripture, in harmony with the Liturgy, and in the context of your daily lives. May this appeal of mine not go unheard!"

JESUS WELCOMES THE SINNERS

One day, many tax collectors and sinners were at table with Jesus and his disciples, "How come your Master eats with sinners?" When Jesus heard this, he said, "the healthy aren't in need of a doctor, the sick are. I desire mercy and not sacrifice, for I came not to call the righteous, but sinners." (Matthew 9: 9-13)

May we also reveal this forgiving face to all.

JESUS FORGIVES A SINFUL WOMAN

Jesus was eating at the table of a Pharisee. In came a woman, a sinner who stood behind Jesus weeping. She began to wet his feet with her tears, to wipe them with her hair. She kissed his feet and anointed them with oil. "Because she has shown great love, her many sins are forgiven." (Luke 7:

JESUS WELCOMES CHILDREN

People were bringing children to Jesus for him to touch, but the disciples rebuked them. Jesus said, "Let the children come to me! For such as these is the Kingdom of God!" Then he put his arms around the children and blessed them. (Mark 10:13-16)

JESUS FORGIVES THE ADULTEROUS WOMAN

A woman who had been caught in adultery was brought to Jesus. The Pharisees said to him, "In the Torah, Moses commanded us to stone such women. So what do you say?" Jesus said, "Let whoever is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her."... "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?"..."Neither do I condemn you. Go your way and from now on sin no more." (John 8:2-11)

Jesus: your forgiveness is offered to all. May your own mercy abide in us and bring us to help and understand others instead of condemning them.

JESUS FORGIVES THE CRIMINAL

Jesus has been crucified between two criminals. One of them said, "Aren't you the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him and said, "We were sentenced justly, we're being paid back fittingly for what we did, while this fellow has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus remember me when you come into your kingdom!" Jesus answered, "Amen, I say to you, this day, you'll be with me in Paradise." (Luke 23: 39-43)

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Saint Rose Venerini

The Conference Patroness Feast day: May 7

She was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on October 15, 2006.

REFLECTION

Whatever state of life God calls us to, we bring with us an assortment of experiences, interests and gifts—however small they seem to us. Rose's life stands as a reminder that all we are is meant to be put to service wherever we find ourselves.

Rose was born at Viterbo in Italy, the daughter of a doctor. Following the death of her fiancé she entered a convent, but soon returned home to care for her newly widowed mother. Meanwhile, Rose invited the women of the neighborhood to recite the rosary in her home, forming a sort of sodality with them. As she looked to her future, Rose became convinced that she was called to become a teacher in the world rather than a contemplative nun in a convent. She was a born teacher, and the free school for girls she opened in 1685 was well received.

Soon the cardinal invited her to oversee the administration of schools in his diocese of Montefiascone. As Rose's reputation grew, she was called upon to organize schools in many parts of Italy, including Rome. Rose often met considerable opposition but was never deterred.

She died in Rome in 1728, where a number of miracles were attributed to her. She was beatified in 1952 and canonized in 2006. The sodality, or group of women she had invited to prayer, was ultimately given the rank of a religious congregation. Today, the Venerini Sisters can be found in the United States and elsewhere, working among Italian immigrants.



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Guide to Confession

BEFORE GOING TO CONFESSION:

- 1. Pray. Ask God to give you the grace to make a good confession.
- 2. Examine your conscience. Reflect on your life, trying to recall all the times you sinned against God since your last confession.
- 3. Be truly sorry for your sins.
- 4. Make the resolution to avoid committing these sins in the future.

DURING CONFESSION:

- 1. Upon entering the confessional take your place and greet the priest.
- 2. Then make the sign of the Cross and say the following: "Bless me father, for I have sinned. It has been (state how many days, weeks, months, or years) since my last confession. These are my sins."
- 4. At this time, confess your sins briefly and clearly. It might be helpful to start with the one that is most difficult to say since it will make it easier to mention the rest. Remember that for a confession to be valid all mortal sins must be confessed. If you do not know whether a sin is mortal or not, ask the priest for guidance. If you do not know what to say, feel uneasy or ashamed, simply ask the priest to assist you. Be assured that he will help you to make a good confession. Simply answer the questions he might ask you without hiding anything out of shame or fear. Place your trust in God who is your merciful Father and wants to forgive you.
- 5. When you finish confessing your sins, say: "...and I am truly sorry for all my sins."
- 6. The priest will then give you some words of advice and/or encouragement to help you become a better person and a more faithful disciple of Jesus Christ.
- 7. Following this, he will assign you a penance which you are to do when you leave the confessional. It might be something like saying a few prayers, doing an act of charity, or making some sacrifice.
- 8. After giving you the penance, the priest will ask you to say the Act of Contrition. You may say whichever one you know. If you do not know an Act of Contrition, ask the priest to assist you.
- 9. The priest will say the Prayer of Absolution. Listen attentively to that prayer, bless yourself as he makes the Sign of the Cross and at the end of the prayer, answer, "Amen."
- 10. After giving you absolution, the priest will say, "Your sins are forgiven. Go in peace." and you respond, "Thanks be to God."

AFTER CONFESSION:

- 1. Say a prayer of thanksgiving. Give thanks to God for the gift of his infinite mercy and for the sacrament you have just received.
- 2. Do your penance. It is advisable that you do your penance as soon as possible so that you will not forget to do it.
