Vision 2030 – Preparing for the Future

A lot has changed in the Diocese of Scranton during its more than 150-year history. The challenges and opportunities we face are not unique, but they are becoming more urgent by the day. Many other dioceses are responding to similar circumstances, particularly in the northeastern part of the country. Many times the resources of a parish, or the diocese itself, are utilized to maintain the "status quo." This process is truly about working to strengthen all aspects of parish life, with the emphasis on "mission" over "maintenance." We all have a responsibility to make the best use of the resources that God has given to us to fulfill the mission of the Church. By working together, we hope to strengthen the most vibrant expressions of parish life and to embrace the unavoidable changes that require us to respond in new ways.

4 Priorities that Drive Change:

- 1. Fewer Parishioners Supporting the Mission of the **Church**—Long before the COVID-19 pandemic impacted parishes, regular weekend Mass attendance had been on the decline. The total number of parishioners who were registered in all parishes of the Diocese of Scranton dropped by more than 16% between 2014 and 2020. The total number of Baptisms, First Communions and Confirmations also dropped during this time. Changing demographics, generational differences, and the consequences of prior reconfiguration and the clergy abuse crisis contribute to the diminishing number of people in our parishes.
- 2. **Financial Challenges**—Parishes are more expensive to maintain now than they were in the past. With a fewer number of parishioners supporting the mission of the church overall, some parish offertories are not able to keep up with current realities.
- 3. **Parish Infrastructure Needs**—Many parish buildings were built in a different era and there are countless facilities with deferred maintenance needs and no planned funding stream for necessary repairs. The Diocese of Scranton must continue to evaluate where and how to best invest resources not only a particular parish-level, but also the deanery and diocesan levels.
- 4. Diminishing Number of Ordained Priests—Over the coming decade and beyond, the Diocese of Scranton faces a decreasing number of priests. A fewer number of priests will represent a significant challenge to the entire diocese. In 2003, the Diocese of Scranton had more than 200 active priests. In 2021, there were 97 diocesan priests active in the Diocese and 16 of those priests are expected to reach retirement age by 2025 and 19 additional priests are projected for retirement between 2025-2030.


2022 – February 2023! Topics will cover different aspects of the Christian Initiation process such as recovering the vision, canonical issues, preaching the rites, and many more!

Revised Order of Penance

The revised translation for the *Order of Penance* was approved by the Bishops of the United States on June 17, 2021. It was confirmed by the Congregation for Divine Worship and Discipline of the Sacraments on April 25, 2022.

Archbishop Jose' Gomez, president of the USCCB, has issued a Decree of Publication. The rite may be used in the liturgy as of Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2023. Its use is obligatory in the dio-



ceses of the United States on April 16, 2023 – The Second Sunday of Easter/Divine Mercy Sunday.

Four publishers will produce ritual editions – Catholic Book Publishing (www.catholicbookpublishing.com), Liturgy Training Publications (www.ltp.org), Magnificat (www.magnificat.com), and Midwest Theological Forum (www.theologicalforum.org). Pre-sales began October 1, 2022.

It is with great pleasure that we announce two staff members who are joining the Office for Parish Life team. As you know, several members of the OPL team left their positions in recent months to pursue new opportunities, which has allowed us the ability to restructure roles and responsibilities (and give the positions new titles) before finding qualified candidates. We are confident that the Office for Parish Life will continue to serve you, your staff, and your parishioners through the challenges and opportunities that face our local Church, including the Vision 2030 planning process.

Dominick Costantino joined the Diocesan Office for Parish Life as *Manager of Parish Renewal* on August 16th. This position will help to coordinate pastoral planning initiatives in the Diocese of Scranton and will act as a liaison between all those involved in the ongoing Vision 2030 planning process, including clergy, parish councils, facilitators and diocesan departments. The Manager of Parish Renewal will also help gather and analyze data that will be used to inform the pastoral planning process. Since 2015, Dominick has been working in our Vocations Office as Program Coordinator. During his time in that position, he helped to organize many events including discernment retreats, Quo Vadis Days and the annual Leave a Mark Mass. A resident of West Wyoming, Dominick is looking forward to bringing his already established relationships in our diocese to the Office for Parish Life and making

sure pastoral planning efforts continue in an organized fashion. Until a new Vocation Program Coordinator is hired, Dominick will also continue to assist Father Alex Roche, Diocesan Vocations Director, as needed.

Marianne Guarnieri joined the Diocesan Office for Parish Life as Director of Discipleship on September 26. This position will expand on the roles and responsibilities that Jacki Douglas previously held as Director of Word and Lifelong Faith Formation. In addition to working with religious education programs, this position will also work with parishes to become missionary outposts that form disciples and send them on mission. While the Director of Discipleship will continue to identify best practices for catechetical formation in parishes and implement plans for forming families of faith, catechetical leaders and catechists, this position will offer support to priests/parishes regarding evangelistic efforts. Marianne is a Pittston native who attended Sacred Heart Elementary School in Wilkes-Barre, Bishop O'Reilly High School in Kingston and Misericordia University in Dallas. She has a Mas-



ter's degree in Catechetics from Franciscan University of Steubenville as well as a Master's degree in Not-for-profit organizations from Misericordia University. Since 2019, Marianne has served as Director of Campus Ministry at the College of William and Mary in Virginia. In that role, she has planned and directed many faith-based programs and activities and attended to the spiritual and moral growth of students.



World Mission Sunday—October 23rd

Every year, something special happens on the next-to-last Sunday of October. World Mission Sunday joins all Catholics of the world into one community of faith. At Mass that Sunday, we recommit ourselves to our common vocation, through Baptism to be missionaries, through prayer, participation in the Eucharist, and by giving generously to the collection for the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

In 1926, Pope Piux XI instituted World Mission Sunday for the whole Church with the first worldwide World Mission Sunday collection taking place in October 1927. Pope Francis' message for World Mission Sunday this year reflects on the theme: "You shall be my witnesses" (Acts 1:8). He reminds us that the Church is missionary in nature and that we are called at Baptism to share in this mission together. The Holy Father exclaims, "Would that all of us in the Church were what we already are by virtue of baptism: prophets, witnesses, missionaries of the Lord, by the power of the Holy Spirit, to the ends of the earth!"

On World Mission Sunday, we join our Holy Father in supporting his missions. As we pray and respond here at home, we share in those celebrations taking place in every parish and school throughout the world. Together, through our prayers and financial support, we bring the Lord's mercy and concrete help to the most vulnerable communities in the Pope's missions.

In a world where so much divides us, World Mission Sunday rejoices in our unity as missionaries by our Baptism, as it offers each one of us an opportunity to support the life-giving presence of the Church among the poor and marginalized in more than 1,100 mission dioceses.


Save the Date for Leave a Mark 2022!



On Sunday, November 6, the Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, will celebrate the annual Leave a Mark Mass which is celebrating its 7th anniversary in 2022. The idea for the Mass came after Pope Francis spoke to pilgrims at World Youth Day 2016 in Poland. "Dear young

people, we didn't come into this world to 'vegetate,' to take it easy, to make our lives a comfortable sofa to fall asleep on," the Holy Father said in 2016. "No, we came for another reason: to leave a mark. It is very sad to pass through life without leaving a mark."

For the past few years, hundreds of young people have gathered in the Cathedral of Saint Peter with Bishop Bambera to kickoff National Vocation Awareness Week in the Diocese of Scranton. Bishop Bambera is inviting the young church of the Diocese of Scranton to gather once again this year in the Cathedral of Saint Peter on Sunday, November 6, 2022, for a special Mass at 5:00PM. Fr. Ryan Glenn, Assistant Pastor at St. Matthew's in East Stroudsburg will be the homilist. A reception featuring live music and food truck will follow.
