


Bishop Bambera will once again offer video reflections for the faithful of the Diocese of Scranton this Advent Season.

Masses, processions, and celebrations for Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe



Through the intercession of "Virgen de Guadalupe," plans for the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe in December are proceeding in many different parishes.


Particularly in the areas of large Latino populations in the Diocese of Scranton, the annual observance commemorates the appearance of the Virgin Mary to a Mexican Indian peasant — now venerated as Saint Juan Diego — in December 1531 in Tepeyac, near present-day Mexico City.

The Blessed Mother's appearance is believed to have resulted in millions of conversions to Catholicism, and her message of hope continues to inspire those of Hispanic descent. In 1946, Pope Pius XII declared Our Lady of Guadalupe as Patroness of the Americas.

The Our Lady of Guadalupe feast is officially held on Dec. 12 but many celebrations and Novenas will be held in parishes leading up to that day - in which everyone is welcome to join!

Pope says he has serious bronchial infection



"As you can see, I am alive," Pope Francis told a group of health care managers Nov. 30.

At the brief meeting with participants in a seminar on the ethics of health care management, the pope said he was suffering from a "bronchial condition. Thank God it was not pneumonia," but he said it was a very serious bronchial infection.

"I no longer have a fever, but I am still on antibiotics and things like that," he told the group.

He had canceled his appointments Nov. 25 because of "flu-like symptoms" and went that afternoon to a Rome hospital for a CT scan of his chest. In the following days, he canceled some appointments and had aides read his prepared texts at other events.

Evangelization includes caring for the poor and the earth, pope says



An effective proclamation of the Gospel must speak with hope to the reallife problems of the poor, to the need to protect the earth and to the ability of people of good will to change the social and financial systems that harm the poor and the environment, Pope Francis said.

"Ten years after the publication of 'Evangelii Gaudium' ('The Joy of the Gospel'), let us reaffirm that only if we listen to the often-silenced cry of the earth and of the poor can we fulfill our evangelizing mission, live the life Jesus proposes to us and contribute to solving the grave problems of humanity," the pope wrote to a conference marking the anniversary of his first exhortation.

Ave Maria University offers free Catholic online courses highlighting the true, good, beautiful



Abortions increased during the last year with Roe still in place, CDC report says



The number of abortions in the U.S. increased in 2021, according to new data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. national public health agency, and the agency's last report of such data with Roe v. Wade still in place.

For nearly 50 years following the Jan. 22, 1973, Roe decision, abortion was legally considered a constitutional right. The Supreme Court later overturned the Roe decision in June 2022 with its decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, allowing both recent and longestablished state laws restricting abortion access to take effect.

Since the Dobbs decision in 2022, states across the country have alternately moved to restrict or expand access to abortion.
