"I'm very excited. It seems like when I first entered seminary it would never get here, it seemed very far away, and now to think that I'm on the doorstep of it, is pretty incredible," Dzwonczyk said. "I'm also very nervous. I would imagine that this is how people feel before they're about to get married, very nervous recognizing the weight of the commitment, but I've also been feeling great peace in my prayer and in the conversations with my brothers at the seminary."

"It is a big step so there is some anxiety about it, which I think is a good sign, because it's a very natural sign, but it's coming out of excitement," McCarroll added. "I'm excited to serve and minister in a new way, a way that I've been preparing for."

Once ordained a deacon, McCarroll is looking forward to preaching at Mass. His first experience will come the same day

as his Ordination – May 25 – as he joked. will preach the 4 p.m. Vigil Mass at Saint Robert Bellarmine Parish.

"I'm really looking to take the Scriptures and really bring them to life. It is a moment for growth and it is a challenge," he said. "I'm excited for the challenge to grow in that way."


In both cases, the mission of these camps is to help young Catholics learn more about vocations and to deepen their faith through fellowship and prayer.

"Fiat Days is not a new thing for the Church. We've modeled it after Quo Vadis and the idea really came to us to have an event for high school women who are discerning their vocation as well so that they can experience God's presence in their lives, but also through one another, and through the presence of religious sisters who are serving with us," Krya Krzywicki, Vocations Program Coordinator, added.


The Mass was filled with many young people, some who say they considered a call to religious life because of the strong faith of their family.

Most respondents said they had first considered a vocation to the priesthood when they were 16 years old, and the average age of ordination was 34, a number consistent with the range of 33-37 reported since 1999.

CARA's executive director, Jesuit Father Thomas Gaunt, told OSV News that direct encouragement of young men to consider priestly life is a "perennial factor" in vocations, with 89% of the respondents, or nine in 10, reporting they had received such support – usually from Consecrated Life and Vocations of the U.S. a parish priest (63%), friend (41%) or parishioner (41%).

Embracing sustainability: Diocese of Scranton to allow 'green burials'

COVINGTON TWP. - After months of research, discussion and planning, the Diocese of Scranton Catholic Cemeteries Office is now offering the option of a 'green burial' as an alternative to a customary burial or cremation.

The 'Green Burial Council' defines the practice as a "way of caring for the dead with minimal environmental impact that aids in the conservation of natural resources, reduction of carbon emissions, protection of worker health and the restoration and/or preservation of habitat."

The concept of a green burial is rooted in simplicity and sustainability. Unlike traditional burials, which often involve embalming fluids, concrete vaults and non-biodegradable caskets, green burials prioritize returning the body to the earth in its most natural state.

"Green burials are natural way of taking care of burials. a person's burial needs at the time of a death," Kevin Beck, Diocesan Catholic Cemeteries Superintendent, explained. "It entails no outside vaults, which is a concrete vault that we use in most areas, and no fancy metal caskets. It is supposed to be all natural - wood, reed, bamboo, wicker or cloth - creating less disturbance and less of a carbon footprint at that point."

In response to inquiries about the practice of green burials, the Diocese of Scranton is now offering a natural burial section at Saint Catherine's Cemetery near Moscow. Parish cemeteries may offer the service at their discretion and only if following the procedures outlined by the Diocese. Father Thomas Petro, Pastor, Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish in Dupont, announced it. in his parish bulletin that its cemetery will also offer the option directors who have either done it, for individuals.

Alex Burney, who has served as Superintendent at Saint Catherine's Cemetery for the last year, said an area in the back right corner of the cemetery has been selected to accommodate green

"It is right behind the Sisters of the Good Shepherd section and it is a nice green area. The land is not one-hundred percent level, but that helps to make it natural," Burney said. "We have 12 graves available right now. However, we have a lot of rom in front of it to be able to expand, so we would be able to do 100 graves and we have other sections that we would also be able to make green burial sections in the cemetery."

Because embalming is not conducted with a green burial, a body can only be preserved by refrigeration for 36 to 48 hours, so anyone contemplating the new practice should inform family members well in advance. While the cemetery provides the necessary space, a licensed funeral director must administer

Mr. Loughney submitted a petition to the Most Holy Father, Pope Francis, requesting dispensation from the clerical state, which has been granted and is final.

Loughney is no longer a member of the clergy, nor has any of the privileges or responsibilities of the priesthood. A priest who has been dispensed from the clerical state may not celebrate Mass or confer the Sacraments. He may no longer be called "Father" or wear clerical attire.

Mr. Loughney now lives privately and is no longer affiliated with the Diocese of Scranton in any official capacity.



A message from the Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese of Scranton

Dear Friends,

As the Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese of Scranton, it is my privilege to present the 2022-2023 audited financial report for the Diocese of Scranton Administrative Offices. This report provides an overview of the prudent use of funds that have been received for the period covering July 1, 2022, to June 30, 2023.

Just as Bishop Bambera has stressed the importance of parishes being transparent with their financial information - as demonstrated by having each parish publish its financial five-year trend every January - it is equally important for the Diocese to also share the care and prudence with which it manages the resources that you, the faithful, entrust to our care.

I am pleased to inform you that for the third consecutive year, *Voice of the Faithful*, a lay organization of faithful Catholics has named the Diocese of Scranton as being one of the most financially transparent dioceses in the United States. For the last seven years, the group has reviewed all U.S. Catholic dioceses' online financial documents - and I am proud to say that once again we have received an overall score of 100% for financial transparency in 2023. We were only one of ten dioceses to achieve such a high rating!

Among the key points of the 2022-2023 fiscal report are:

- The Diocese had a net gain from operations in the amount of \$2,576,899. This came primarily from Employee Retention Tax Credit (ERTC) income and bequests.
- Catholic Schools Assessments are now billed through the Diocesan Administrative Office. Revenue in 2023 for this assessment is \$6,041,629, net an allowance of \$453,559. Educational expenses in 2023 also include the payment of these school assessments of \$6,041,629 to Diocesan Catholic Schools.
- Funds raised by the 2022 Diocesan Annual Appeal totaled \$4,245,866. The Diocese returned \$192,860 directly to parishes that exceeded their goal for the campaign. This means the revenue from the Appeal to the Diocese totaled \$4,053,006. Funds raised by the 2021 Diocesan Annual Appeal totaled \$4,458,893. In that year, the Diocese returned \$205,567 directly to parishes that exceeded their goal for the campaign. Revenue from the 2021 Appeal totaled \$4,253,326.
- Employee Retention Tax Credit income of \$1,743,921 is included in 2023. Related consulting fees of \$277,024 for this income are included in 2023 Administrative expenses.

- 2022 Community and Social Service expenses included a one-time contribution

 As the Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese of Scranton, it is my privilege of \$2.3 million to the Catholic Social Services to help provide funding for its defined benefit pension plan.
 - The current year (2022-2023) included a \$1.9 million positive pension adjustment due to the effect of higher interest rates on the calculation of the pension obligation. The current year also included \$1 million of unrealized gains on investments. The prior fiscal year (2021-2022) included a transfer of \$7.2 million to the Lay Pension Plan and a \$2.1 million transfer back to the Diocese of Scranton Institute for a prior year pension contribution. These transfers were offset by a \$2.4 million positive net pension adjustment due to the effect of rising interest rates on the calculation of the pension obligation. The prior year included a \$9.9 million unrealized loss on investments to large, unfavorable market fluctuations during the 2021-2022 year.
 - As in previous years, the financial statements of the Diocesan Administrative Offices have been independently audited by McGrail Merkel Quinn & Associates, P.C., Certified Public Accounts. The statements include activities related to the Diocesan Administrative Offices, not activities related to Catholic Social Services or the Catholic School System. These organizations are audited separately. The statements also do not include parish activities.

The continuing generosity of the Catholic community and the sharing of time, talent and treasure make possible the good works of our Church in the Diocese of Scranton.





Diocesan Offices Supporting the Clergy, all 110 Parishes and the Faithful of the Church of Scranton

Administrative Offices and Chancellor: The Chancery is composed of those institutes and persons who assist the Bishop in governing the entire Diocese, especially in providing for the administration of the Diocese and directing pastoral action.

Catholic Schools: The Catholic Schools Office is committed to educating students and their families in the Catholic faith. The office provides a Catholic education that is spiritually sound and academically excellent and strives to prepare students to be faith-filled leaders and life-long leaders dedicated to serving the Church and society.

Catholic Social Services: Catholic Social Services serves individuals and families in poverty and hardship, responding compassionately to their needs. The agency advocates for individual dignity and self-sufficiency and actively works to replace despair with hope.

Child Protection/Victim Assistance: The Safe Environment Office oversees the creation and implementation of child protection programs and policies across the Diocese. Staff ensures the safest possible place in which children, young people and adults can minister, study and work.

Communications: The mission of the Communications Office is to evangelize through informing all about the Good News of the Catholic faith, the teachings of the Holy Father and our Bishop, Diocesan and parish ministries, programs and events.

Development Office: Offers assistance and support to the development and stewardship programs of all Diocesan parishes, schools and other Catholic institutions. This office helps secure necessary funds to assist the Diocese in its mission to serve God's people.

Finance Office: The Diocesan Finance Office is responsible for administering the temporal resources of the Diocese under the authority of the Bishop. The Finance Office provides assistance with financial activities for diocesan parishes and schools and other related organizations.

Human Resources: Serves more than 1,200 employees of our parishes, schools and Diocesan offices, centrally administering insurance and benefit programs such as medical, dental, life insurance and 403(b) retirement savings plans.

Information Technology: Provides information technology support for diocesan ministries, parishes and offices.

Parish Life Office: The Office for Parish Life works directly on-site in parishes to provide leadership formation, spiritual renewal, program design and resourcing, training for people in all types of parish ministry and consulting on specific parish needs.

Pontifical Mission Societies: The Pontifical Mission Societies of the Diocese of Scranton promotes a mission spirituality and global vision in the hearts and minds of the faithful.

Property and Risk Management: Provides technical and fiduciary oversight in addition to project management for the physical development and maintenance of parish and diocesan properties.

Tribunal: The Diocesan Tribunal acts as the Judicial Arm of the Diocesan Bishop upholding rights and responding to grievances relating to Church Law. Deals mainly in the investigation of and pronouncements on petitions regarding invalidity of marriage (Annulments).

Vocations/Clergy Formation: The Vocations Office seeks to foster vocations to the Priesthood and Religious Life and provide opportunities for discernment and mentoring of potential seminary candidates.

National Eucharistic Pilgrimage pilgrims walk among American saints on **Eastern route**

Beginning in New Haven, Connecticut, May 18, the day before Pentecost, the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Route is the one that will attract the most attention locally.

The roughly 1,000-mile route will be traveled by six perpetual pilgrims accompanied by Father Roger Landry, a priest of the Diocese of Fall River, Massachusetts, who serves as the Catholic chaplain at Columbia University in New York.

While Catholics may join the pilgrims for legs of their journey, they are especially encouraged to join the route's public events, which include Masses, all-night adoration, a boat-based procession, service projects, testimonies, socializing and meals with regional flair.

As the perpetual pilgrims wind their way toward Indianapolis, they plan to stop for prayer and other events at both Catholic and secular sites. In New York City, for example, the pilgrims are stopping at both the St. Frances Cabrini Shrine and the Statue of Liberty. Some stops are less than an hour, while others may stretch to a day or more.

The route is named for St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first American-born saint. and includes stops at places she served in New York and Maryland.

The following is a list of selected highlights from the pilgrimage's Eastern route.

July 6

Downtown Cincinnati

The pilgrimage will continue through the Diocese of Columbus, Ohio, and the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. with a July 6 Mass celebrated by Archbishop Dennis M. Schnurr at Cincinnati's Cathedral Basilica of St. Peter in Chains. The Mass is followed by a Eucharistic procession through downtown and a Eucharistic festival at the city's Fountain Square. The Seton Route enters the Archdiocese of Indianapolis July 8 with several events in Indianapolis ahead of the National Eucharistic Congress.

May 25

St. Frances Cabrini Shrine, New York

Pilgrims will spend time in the Archdiocese of New York, where they'll stop May 25 at the St. Frances Cabrini Shrine in Manhattan to venerate the saint, who left Italy with six of her religious community's sisters in 1889 to serve Italian immigrants in the New York slums. (Her life is the subject of the recently released film "Cabrini.") That night, New York Auxiliary Bishop Gerardo J. Colacicco and the Dominican Sisters of Hawthorne - whose Massachusetts-born founder, Rose Hawthorne Lathrop, was declared venerable in March: will host adoration at St. Vincent Ferrer Church. While still in the city, the pilgrimage will process across the Brooklyn Bridge into the Diocese of Brooklyn May 26, and the following day take the Dorothy Day Ferry - named for the Catholic Worker Movement co-founder and servant of God to the Statue of Liberty State Park for Eucharistic Adoration.

May 18 Start

Blessed Michael McGivney Parish, New Haven, Connecticut

The pilgrimage begins May 18 with a solemn, extended vigil Mass for Pentecost followed by all-night Eucharistic adoration at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, where Blessed Michael McGiveny was ministering when he founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882. The parish church now houses his tomb. The pilgrims process May 19 to the nearby parish of St. Joseph for Mass before traveling by boat to Bridgeport.



June 8

Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Washington, followed by Ohio River Procession

The pilgrimage will continue into the Archdiocese of Washington with Mass June 8 at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception followed by a procession with stops at The Catholic University of America campus. It ther heads northwest through western Maryland; the dioceses of Altoona-Johnstown, Greensburg and Pittsburgh in Pennsylvania; Wheeling-Charlestor in West Virginia; and Steubenville, Ohio. Or June 23, Bishop Mark E. Brennan of Wheeling-Charleston and Bishop Paul J. Bradley, apostolic administrator of Steubenville, will lead a "boatercade" Eucharistic procession down the Ohio River aboard a sternwheeler, blessing pilgrims on shore.

June 6

National Shrine of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, Emmitsburg, Maryland

From the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, the pilgrimage travels through the Diocese of Harrisburg into the Archdiocese of Baltimore, where the pilgrims will spend time at the National Shrine of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton June 6. Born in 1774, their route's namesake was a wife. mother of five, teacher, Catholic convert and eventual founder of the first women's religious community established in the U.S. She moved from New York to Emmitsburg in 1809 after her husband died while they were in Italy, which also is where she encountered Catholicism. The following day, the pilgrims will attend Mass and participate in a Eucharistic procession around the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Baltimore's co-cathedral and the first cathedral in the United States.

June 1

National Shrine of St. John Neumann, Philadelphia

The pilgrimage continues through New Jersey's dioceses of Metuchen and Trenton and into Pennsylvania. On June 1, the pilgrimage in Philadelphia for morning Mass at the National Shrine of St. John Neumann, who served as bishop of Philadelphia from 1852-1860 and was a champion of the Catholic parochial school system in the U.S. That evening, the shrine will host a "Eucharistic encounter" and open mic night for young adults. The following day, the pilgrims will venerate another Philadelphia saint, St. Katharine Drexel, who is entombed at the Cathedral Basilica of Sts. Peter and Paul.



For more than 700 years, the Catholic Church has celebrated "jubilee" or "holy" years as special times to renew people's faith and experience God's forgiveness, particularly by going on pilgrimage.

On May 9, 2024, Pope Francis formally proclaimed the Holy Year 2025 through a document, called a "bull of indiction," which was read in front of the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica at the Vatican.

"The time has come for a new Jubilee when once more the Holy Door will be flung open to invite everyone to an intense experience of the love of God that awakens in hearts the sure hope of salvation in Christ," Pope Francis said in the document titled, "Spes Non Confundit" (Hope Does Not Disappoint).

The Holy Year will open at the Vatican Dec. 24 this year and close Jan. 6, 2026, the Feast of Epiphany.

Bishop Joseph C. Bambera is inviting the faithful of the Diocese of Scranton to celebrate the 2025 Holy Year with him through a special pilgrimage opportunity that is being planned. The most exciting and wellknown rite of the Jubilee Year is the opening of the Holy Door at the four major basilicas of Rome: St. Peter's Basilica, the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran, the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls, and the Basilica of St. Mary Major, which will be included in the trip.

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


The World Mission Rosary embodies this vision of peace as a holistic and inclusive reality, encompassing social justice, reconciliation, and the common

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
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Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570) 862-7551.

The Oblates of Saint Joseph have been serving in the Diocese of Scranton since 1929, as well as in 18 countries worldwide.


