HONESDALE – As a young boy, William Asinari can clearly recall many of the formative moments that were forged in his home parish - the faith community of Saint John the Evangelist in Wayne County.

"I remember sitting in Saint John the Evangelist Church, looking up from the pews, and seeing one of the priests at the time approaching the altar and there was this unexplainable desire that just shot through me," he said. "I said, 'I want to do that, I don't know why, but I want to do that."

It took him years to realize that God was calling him to the priesthood.

"It's a feeling that I have not felt with anything else," Asinari said. "I just associated the priesthood with that feeling and then as I developed more spiritually, I realized that God was pointing me in a direction."

When his parish priest would give homilies on vocations to the priesthood, Asinari also found encouragement from the "little old ladies" of Saint John the Evangelist Parish, who would turn to him and say "you, you!"

"God has written this amazing story and allowed me to play in it and I'm profoundly grateful," he explained.

On Saturday, June 29, 2024, Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, will ordain Reverend Mr. William A. Asinari to the Order of the Priesthood for service in the Diocese of Scranton.

Everything connects and the more I look back at those experiences that might have been bad, God brought so much good out of it. I can look back and see what used to be thorns are now roses," he said. "My whole life is a gift that I'm happy to give, I'm humbled to give, especially when looking at the People

Asinari, 25, is the son of Robert and Cathleen Asinari, and he attended Saint Mary's Seminary and University in Baltimore.

"I loved my time at Saint Mary's. It has forced me to stretch myself and grow in ways that I haven't really tried before," Asinari reflected. "I exceeded the limits that I thought I had. I haven't had moments of prayer quite as deep as when I was there."

Asinari said he is also thankful for the many priests "It is special to be here with the people who have and parish communities that he has served in over the years, including Clarks Summit and Carbondale.

"Our hearts are heavy, but we give thanks to God for having been able to encounter him in this sacred place," lector Jean Yamialkowski said in welcoming the faithful to the 2 p.m. Mass. "Words from our Centennial Mass, spoken by Father Hilary Malinowski, continue to have meaning for us today. He said, 'Here our faith life began, grew and continues to mature. As we look around and feel so much at home today, may we be warmed, enriched and empowered to take with us from this holy place, the most Sacred Presence of God to accompany us on our journey to our eternal home with him."

The Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, served as principal celebrant and homilist for the closing liturgy. Father Seth D. Wasnock, V.F., Pastor, Saint Rose of Lima Parish and Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, Carbondale, and Father Joseph J. Mosley, Senior Priest, concelebrated the Mass, along with several other priests who were native sons of Saint Michael's or who had served the church.

"Saint Michael's Parish was founded serve a growing community of predominantly Polish immigrants who journeyed to this portion of God's kingdom to build a better life for themselves and their families," Bishop Bambera said during his homily. "My dad's grandparents, Jacob and Antoinette Pilny, were among its founding members. When analyzing the priority drivers, it was determined that basic operational costs of Saint Michael's averaged \$66,000 annually and the offertory collected was insufficient to meet those needs, in addition to facility studies indicating the church would need more than \$800,000 in maintenance over the next decade.



Stories of conversion, 'amazing' encounters mark National Eucharistic Pilgrimage

(OSV News) - As a Eucharistic procession made its way May 28 through Victoria, Texas, a 20-something man sitting on the side of a street caught Charlie McCullough's attention. McCullough stopped to talk with him, explaining what was going on: The procession was part of the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage en route to Indianapolis for the National Eucharistic Congress, and the Eucharist they were walking behind is really, truly Jesus.

"He had grown up in the Protestant faith and had never seen a Eucharistic procession before, and was at a time in life where he was asking a lot of big questions about what is the reason I exist for, what's the purpose of life, all these things," McCullough, one of six perpetual pilgrims on the pilgrimage's southern St. Juan Diego route, recalled May 29. "We talked briefly and I kept walking."

About five blocks later, McCullough looked over his shoulder and saw the man running after the procession. He caught up to McCullough and asked if they could talk more.

"He told me that that morning was the first time he had tried to pray in years. He opened his Bible, and he didn't know if the Lord had heard him. And when we walked by - when Jesus Christ walked by - he knew something was different. And he knew that he wanted to follow the Lord, and he had so many questions about how and what he wants to do, and there was this zeal welling got to pray with him and encourage him."

Released by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops May 28, the "National Synthesis of the People of God in the United States of America for the Interim Stage of the 2021-2024 Synod" summarizes responses from more than 35,000 participants and over 1,000 listening sessions.



Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570) 862-7551.


