# Eight men to be ordained Permanent Deacons on Nov. 29

SCRANTON - The Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, will ordain eight men as permanent deacons for the Diocese of Scranton at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 29, 2025, at the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton.

The newly ordained deacons will join the ranks of clergy who minister to the faithful in parishes and other settings throughout the Diocese.

During the Mass of Ordination, Bishop Bambera will ordain the following men to serve permanently in the Order of Deacon: Fernando Alves, Francisco Castelan, Michaelangelo Colaneri, Frank Fanelli, Joel Marte, Jorge Roca, Rafael Sanchez Velasquez, and Christian Saunders.

"For me, the deacon is the bridge between the sanctuary and the people," Michaelangelo Colaneri, a parishioner of the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton, said. "You're allowed to be right next to the mystery of God on the altar on Sunday, and then you're able to take that majesty that comes from Him and extend it to the people in your parish."

Colaneri calls his upcoming ordination a "tremendous responsibility and a beautiful call."

"Being able to bring the blessings of God from the altar to the kitchen table is probably the greatest thing I could ever ask for," he stated.

Both Frank Fanelli, a parishioner of Saint Ann Parish in Shohola, and Fernando Alves, a parishioner of Saint Luke Parish in Stroudsburg said their calls to the diaconate grew naturally from years of service to others.

"I was approached by Deacon Joe Connelly while feeding the needy," Fanelli explained. "He felt that I would be a good candidate. I've been a Eucharistic Minister for many years, and I just felt the need to go further with my faith."

"I first started teaching religious education, then helping in the soup kitchen. When the parish reopened after COVID, I helped as an usher and with the cleaning crew. With time, the desire to be a deacon started growing in me, but I never felt worthy of that," Alves added.

All the men being ordained will complete a five-year formation program and become members of the three-fold ordained ministry that consists of bishops, priests, and

### Meet the Class of 2026 Permanent Deacons

A deacon's service has three aspects: word, worship, and charity. He can perform certain ministerial functions such as administering baptism; serving as the deacon at the Mass, including proclaiming the Gospel, preaching the homily and distributing Holy Communion; bringing viaticum to the sick; presiding at wake services, funeral liturgies and burial rites and with permission by the pastor, may celebrate the Sacrament of Matrimony.

Deacons also minister to the needs of families, single parents, students, the aged and infirmed, the imprisoned and those who suffer from poverty or addictions.

"I'm really moved by service to those that could never reciprocate," Christian Saunders, a parishioner of Saint Paul Parish in Scranton, said. "I feel like that is service to Christ."

Saunders said his calling to the diaconate began early in life.

"Since I was a teenager, I felt a call to serve God," he added. "At the age of 40, I knew that I would not be able to ignore that call anymore."

Francisco Castelan began his formation program in Brooklyn, N.Y. before moving to the Scranton area and attending Mass at Saint Teresa of Calcutta Parish.

"I was not thinking about becoming a deacon, but in my (former) parish, five or six people said I could become a deacon," he said. "I listened to call of Jesus and that is why I decided to be a servant of Him."

All are welcome to attend the Ordination Mass at the Cathedral of Saint Peter. For those unable to attend in person, CTV: Catholic Television of the Diocese of Scranton will provide a live broadcast of the Mass. A livestream will also be available on the Diocese of Scranton website, YouTube channel, and



across all Diocesan social media platforms.

# Jubilee Mass for Religious recognizes 1,415 years of service

SCRANTON - With prayers of thanksgiving and deep gratitude, the Diocese of Scranton celebrated its annual Jubilee Mass for Women and Men Religious on Sunday, Oct. 26, 2025, at the Cathedral of Saint Peter.

The Mass honored 23 religious sisters and brothers who are marking milestone anniversaries in consecrated life this year - accounting for a combined 1,415 years of faithful service to God and the Church.

The Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, served as principal celebrant and homilist for the Jubilee Mass. The Bishop expressed heartfelt appreciation to the jubilarians for their lifelong witness of discipleship and prayer - which has spanned 25, 50, 60, 70 and even 75 years in some cases.

"What a blessing we've been given in all of you," Bishop Bambera said. "More than you realize or appreciate, you continually challenge us to trust in a former slave fortress, Bishop Bambera celebrating 60 years of religious life this year. the mercy, love and forgiveness of God something that many of us in the Church forget, all too often."

In his homily for the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Bishop reflected on the Gospel call to authentic discipleship, reminding those gathered that faith must always be lived with integrity and compassion.

"There is a very simple message that I hope we will all take from today's Gospel," the Bishop said. "Jesus calls us to live our lives with integrity. He calls us to give the beliefs that we profess a life."

spoke of the "disconnect" that can sometimes exist between what we profess as Christians and how we live our lives.

As he looked at the jubilarians seated in front of him, the Bishop thanked them for boldly proclaiming the Gospel message in a world that far too often fails to embrace it.

"Your commitment to work for justice for the marginalized – immigrants, the poor, those held captive today by greed and sexual exploitation, and all those oppressed by far too many who deem themselves righteous - provides us with a unique and powerful Drawing upon a personal story from witness to the presence of God at work in our world today in 2025," Bishop Bambera added.

> Among those celebrating jubilees this year is Sister Mary Theresa Wojcicki, a Sister of Christian Charity, who is marking 50 years of religious life. Originally from Great Meadows, N.J., Sister Mary Theresa now ministers at Saint Jude School in Mountain Top.

> "The greatest joy that I have had was to be able to work with children and bring them to Jesus," she said.

Reflecting on her vocation, Sister Mary Theresa shared, "I was impressed with the Sisters of Christian Charity in grade school. I saw that they were cheerful, always happy, and ready to serve – and I have a fourth vow – to serve the poor, the wanted to follow that charism."

Originally from Pittsburgh, Sister Betty spent much of her ministry in North Carolina before returning to live in Scranton. She describes her ministry as a lifelong adventure in faith and friendship.

"My greatest joy has been getting to meet amazing people who are different than I was and being able to expand my understanding of cultures and faiths," she said.

Sister Mary Eleanor Thornton, a Sister of Mercy, who is celebrating 70 years of religious life, said her greatest joy has been spending decades ministering to the poor through social service centers, food programs, and parish outreach.

"It was such a joy and an honor (to serve the poor). God used me to collect food, furniture, and clothing that the poor would need," she said. "I loved gathering volunteers who would help me."

Looking back on seven decades of service, Sister Mary Eleanor found special meaning in Bishop Bambera's homily and his reminder that we can't just call ourselves Christians; we really must live what Jesus Christ wanted us to do.

"It is all God doing it in us. God gives us the gifts," she explained. "I'm just grateful to the Sisters of Mercy that they sick and the uneducated - and that they Sister Elizabeth (Betty) Bullen, a Sister, were willing to let me do the things I could

# U.S. Bishops approve 'special pastoral message' on immigration

BALTIMORE (OSV News) - The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops approved a "special pastoral message on immigration" Nov. 12, voicing "our concern here for immigrants" at their annual fall plenary assembly in Baltimore.

The statement came as a growing number of bishops have acknowledged that some of the Trump administration's immigration policies risk presenting the church with challenges in administering pastoral support and charitable endeavors, as well as religious liberty challenges.

Archbishop Richard G. Henning of Boston told OSV News in an interview that the feeling "we have to say something" on the subject of showing solidarity with immigrants has been "kind of bubbling up from the bishops."

"Obviously, the beliefs of the church have political consequences, but they're not political in the usual sense of the word," he said. "And so there was a real effort to make sure that this would be a pastoral address to our people rather than an attempt to lobby."

Despite differences in age, geography or other viewpoints, Archbishop Henning said, the U.S. bishops have almost universally heard from parishioners or pastors about "suffering the effects of this."

"We're pastors," he said. "We care about the people we serve, and what we're hearing from them is fear and suffering. So it's hard not to want to respond to that."

The statement, released in the late afternoon, said, "As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ."

According to a USCCB news release issued with the text of the statement, this "marked the first time" in 12 years the bishops' conference "invoked this particularly urgent way of speaking as a body of bishops. The last one issued in 2013 was in response to the federal government's contraceptive mandate."

# U.S. Bishops Issue "Special Message" on Immigration

November 12, 2025

As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of Godgiven human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks.

The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (Zechariah 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (2 Corinthians 8:9), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (Luke 10:30–37), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (Matthew 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (John 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (cf. 1 Corinthians 12:26). You are not alone!

We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans 5:5)

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.

# Los obispos de **EEUU** aprueban un 'mensaje especial' sobre la inmigración

BALTIMORE (OSV News) - El 12 de noviembre, la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de Estados Unidos aprobó un "mensaje especial sobre la inmigración", en el que expresaron "nuestra preocupación" por los inmigrantes durante su asamblea plenaria anual de otoño celebrada en Baltimore.

La declaración se produjo cuando un número cada vez mayor de obispos ha reconocido que algunas de las políticas de inmigración de la administración Trump corren el riesgo de presentar a la Iglesia tanto desafíos prácticos en la administración del apoyo pastoral y las iniciativas caritativas, como desafíos a la libertad religiosa en el país.

El arzobispo Richard G. Henning de Boston dijo a OSV News en una entrevista que el sentimiento de "tenemos que decir algo" sobre el tema de mostrar solidaridad con los inmigrantes ha estado "brotando de los obispos".

"Obviamente, las creencias de la Iglesia tienen consecuencias políticas, pero no son políticas en el sentido habitual de la palabra", afirmó. "Por eso se hizo un verdadero esfuerzo para garantizar que se tratara de un discurso pastoral dirigido a nuestro pueblo y no de un intento de presión política".

A pesar de las diferencias de edad, geografia u otros puntos de vista, dijo el arzobispo Henning, los obispos estadounidenses han escuchado casi de forma unánime a feligreses o párrocos hablar sobre "los efectos que esto está causando".

"Somos pastores", dijo el arzobispo. "Nos preocupamos por las personas a las que servimos, v lo que escuchamos de ellas es miedo y sufrimiento. Por lo tanto, es difícil no querer responder a eso".

La declaración, publicada hacia el final de la segunda jornada de la reunión plenaria, decía: "Como pastores, los obispos de los Estados Unidos, estamos unidos a nuestro pueblo en nuestro Señor Jesucristo, por lazos de comunión y compasión".

Según un comunicado de prensa de la USCCB del 12 de noviembre, publicado junto con la declaración traducida al español, este mensaje especial marcó "la primera vez en doce años" que la conferencia episcopal "recurrió a esta forma particularmente urgente de expresarse como cuerpo episcopal. La última vez que lo hizo fue en 2013, en respuesta al mandato federal sobre anticonceptivos".

#### Obispos de Estados Unidos emiten "Mensaje Especial" sobre inmigración

12 de noviembre de 2025

Como pastores, los obispos de los Estados Unidos, estamos unidos a nuestro pueblo en nuestro Señor Jesucristo, por lazos de comunión y compasión. Nos inquieta ver en nuestras comunidades un clima de temor y ansiedad ante las prácticas de perfilamiento y la aplicación de las leyes migratorias. Nos entristece profundamente el tono que ha adoptado el debate contemporáneo y la creciente denigración de los inmigrantes. Nos preocupan las condiciones en los centros de detención y la falta de acceso a una atención pastoral adecuada. Lamentamos que algunos inmigrantes que viven en los Estados Unidos han perdido su estatus migratorio de manera arbitraria. Nos preocupan las amenazas contra la santidad de los lugares de culto, y el carácter especial de los hospitales y las escuelas. Nos entristece profundamente cuando nos encontramos con padres que temen ser detenidos al llevar a sus hijos a la escuela o cuando intentamos consolar a familiares que ya han sido separados de sus seres queridos.

A pesar de los obstáculos y prejuicios, por generaciones, los inmigrantes han contribuido inmensamente al bienestar de nuestra nación. Como obispos católicos, profesamos nuestro amor por nuestro país y oramos por su paz y prosperidad. Por este preciso motivo nos sentimos obligados en este entorno a elevar nuestras voces en defensa de la dignidad humana otorgada por Dios.

La enseñanza católica exhorta a las naciones a reconocer la dignidad fundamental de todas las personas, incluidos los inmigrantes. Como obispos, abogamos por una reforma significativa de las leyes y los procedimientos migratorios de nuestra nación. La dignidad humana y la seguridad nacional no son valores en conflicto. Ambas pueden alcanzarse con buena voluntad y uniendo esfuerzos.

Reconocemos que las naciones tienen la responsabilidad de controlar sus fronteras y establecer un sistema de inmigración justo y ordenado por el bien común. Sin dichos procedimientos, los inmigrantes corren el riesgo de caer en la trata de personas y en otras formas de explotación. Las vías legales y seguras sirven como antídoto frente a esos riesgos.

La enseñanza de la Iglesia se basa en la preocupación fundamental por la persona humana, creada a imagen y semejanza de Dios. (Génesis 1:27). Como pastores, recurrimos a las Sagradas Escrituras y al ejemplo de Dios mismo, donde encontramos la sabiduría de la compasión de Dios. La prioridad del Señor, como nos recuerdan los profetas, es para los más vulnerables: las viudas, los huérfanos, los pobres y los migrantes (Zacarías 7:10). # Prayer vigils for immigrants mark Cabrini feast, commitment to human dignity

SCRANTON - On the feast of the patron saint of immigrants - and a day after the U.S. Catholic Bishops issued a special pastoral message on immigration a coalition of Catholic organizations held a second wave of prayer vigils across the country Nov. 13 for what organizers called a "national day of public witness for our immigrant brothers and sisters."

The latest vigils – which took place on the feast of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini, an Italian immigrant whose ministry to fellow immigrants ultimately led to her canonization as the first American saint came amid growing concern from various faith communities and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops about the impact of hardline immigration policies.

One Family: Catholic Public Witness for locations around the country on Oct. 22.

In Scranton, the Nov. 13 witness began with a 4:30 p.m. Mass at The University of Scranton's Madonna della Strada Chapel, celebrated by university president Rev. Joseph G. Marina, S.J. Following Mass, participants processed by candlelight – a challenge with gusty November wind from the university campus down Monroe Scranton, where they concluded the evening with prayer, song, and personal testimony.

Organizers stressed that the gathering was not a political rally but a public because of where they come from.

"Upholding human dignity is one of issue. This comes right the core teachings that we're taught in the Catholic church. We're in a critical time when we're seeing the devaluing of human lives - of our immigrant and refugee brothers and sisters – and we have to stand against that," she said.



# CSS Food pantries report significant increase in need during SNAP disruptions

and individuals visiting its food pantries this fall, mirroring a trend seen across Pennsylvania and the nation following recent disruptions to federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits.

Even before the temporary freeze in food pantry was experiencing a steady rise she said. in new households seeking help.

In August 2025, the pantry served 39 new families and 794 returning families. That number grew in September, when 51 new families and 783 returning families came through the doors. In October, the pantry assisted 46 new families and 972 returning families – the highest monthly total this year.

"We've seen an increase in families coming in for help with the food pantry and Social Services Director of Lackawanna



SCRANTON - The City of Scranton and Catholic Social Services of the Diocese of Scranton formally announced on Nov. 13 that CSS will staff and operate the city's Code Blue shelter at the Weston Field House for the 2025-2026 winter season.

The shelter, located at 982 Providence Road, opens on nights when the temperatures are expected to fall below 20 degrees or when winter conditions create dangerous windchills. Last winter, Scranton issued approximately 70 Code Blue alerts, with an average of about 15 individuals seeking shelter at Weston Field each night.

"We are proud to continue providing a Code Blue shelter here at Weston Field," Scranton Mayor Paige G. Cognetti said. "The City and each of the partner Task Force, which includes Catholic Social Services, remain committed to addressing the changing needs of those without stable housing in Scranton."

# Parish serves more than 14,000 meals each year to neighbors in need

EAST STROUDSBURG - On a recent Saturday afternoon, the smell of meatballs and sauce filled the air inside the church hall at Saint Matthew Parish. Conversation and laughter were also heard as people from all walks of life shared a meal together - neighbors, families, and even those experiencing homelessness.

With a similar scene playing out on every Thursday and Saturday - the importance of the parish's community meal is clear and more important than ever.

For some guests, the meals are a refuge from the streets. For others, they are a cure for loneliness or provide a way to stretch limited budgets as food prices rise.

"I'm 81 years old now, and I thought my life would be getting easier as I got older, but it's not," Irene Shields, a longtime East Stroudsburg resident who comes to the parish for meals each week, said. "Between the high rent and high anything."

Living only a block and a half away from the church, Shields feels loved and cared for by its parishioners.

Saint Matthew Parish has offered a said. community meal for more than a decade, beginning with a single Saturday dinner, but since the COVID-19 pandemic, the program has expanded to three meals a week, serving more than 14,000 meals each year.

Guests can currently enjoy lunch and dinner on Saturday, as well as a Thursday evening meal.

For Charlie C., who once experienced homelessness, the meal program became a place of stability and even healing.

"In 2015, I lost somebody. She died and I lost my mind for a little while," he explained. "Being homeless around here, They're very, very giving of their time and and having places like this to come, it is really great. You can stay here all day. It is really great to have."

### '40 Days for Life' Rosary gathering during Respect Life Month






